#### Here's Where to Begin

Family history work generally includes three steps:

- 1. Identify your ancestors.
- 2. Find out which ancestors need temple ordinances performed.
- 3. Make certain that the needed ordinances are performed.

If you are just getting started, complete a pedigree chart and a family group record for yourself. On the pedigree chart, list your name first, then your parents' names, and so on. If you are married, complete two family group records—one showing you and the other showing you as a child.

After you have completed these forms for yourself and your immediate family, begin gathering information about the ancestors who are easiest to identify. The most important thing you need is the desire to provide the saving ordinances of the gospel to those in the spirit world waiting to receive them.

Don't forget the powerful influence the Spirit can have in helping you to identify your ancestors. As you exercise faith, names and information thought to be unavailable may come to you in unexpected ways and places. I can truly attest to that!!!
